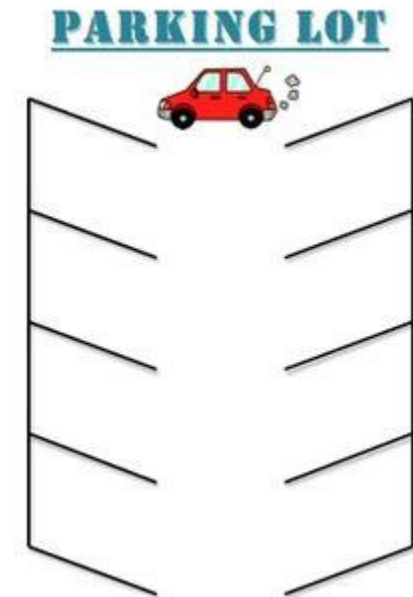

Survey Development & Distribution

- **Purpose of this survey:** To collect perspectives on the development of a continuum of evidence-based, trauma-informed, and prevention-focused Medicaid community mental health services in Virginia.
 - Based on the current array of Medicaid funded services
- **Distribution:**

 - Redistributed internally to relevant team members

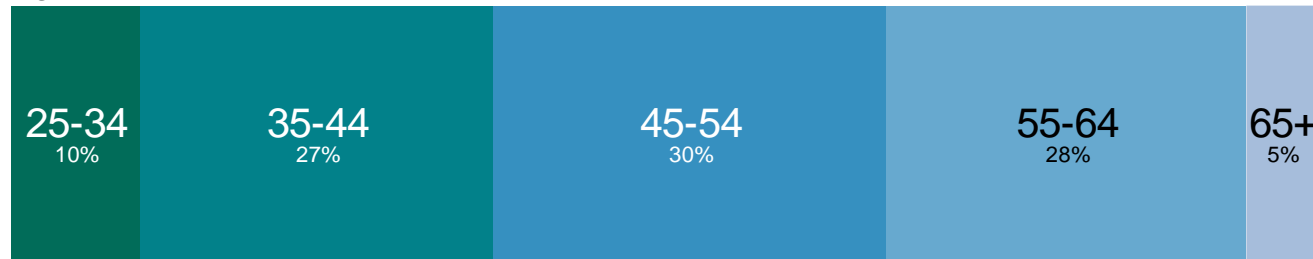
Methodology

- Mixed methods
- Descriptive statistics
- Editing analysis style
 - Editing style of coding to generate codes as they emerge from the data.
 - Segmented according to domains.
 - Codes organized within each domain.
 - Review code list with team, final code/review.
 - Summarizing major thematic constructs.

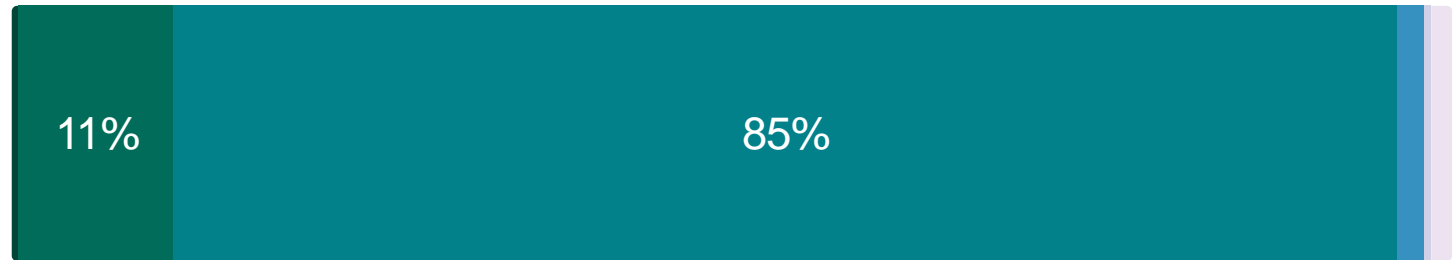

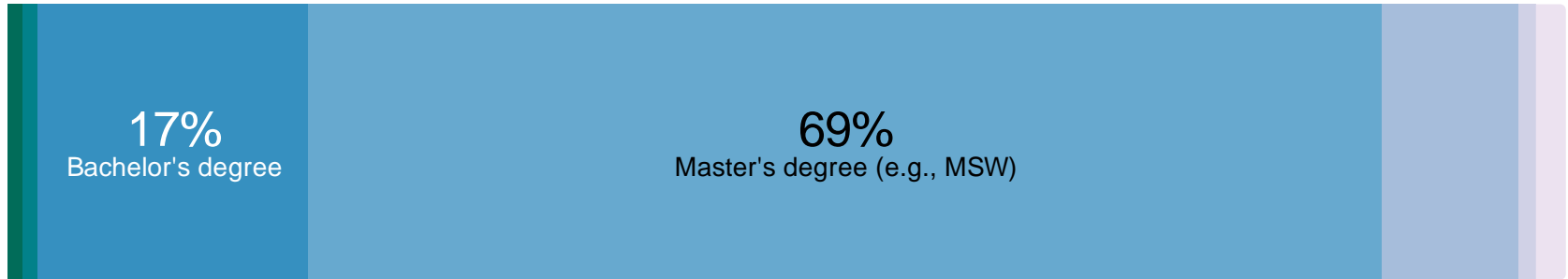

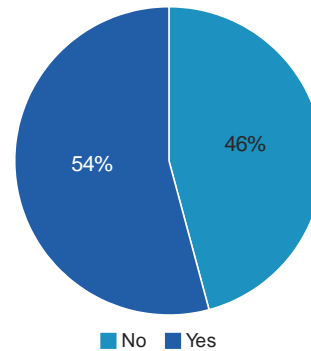

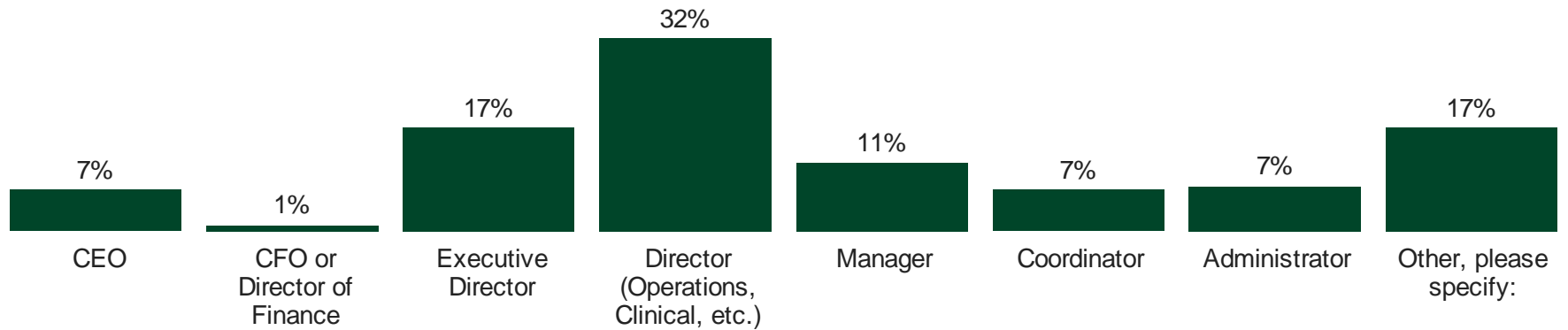

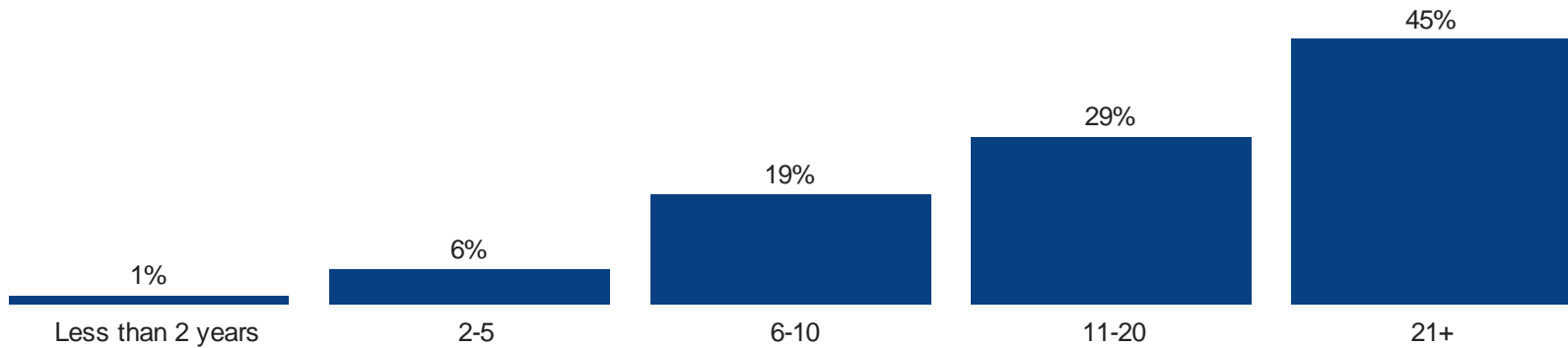
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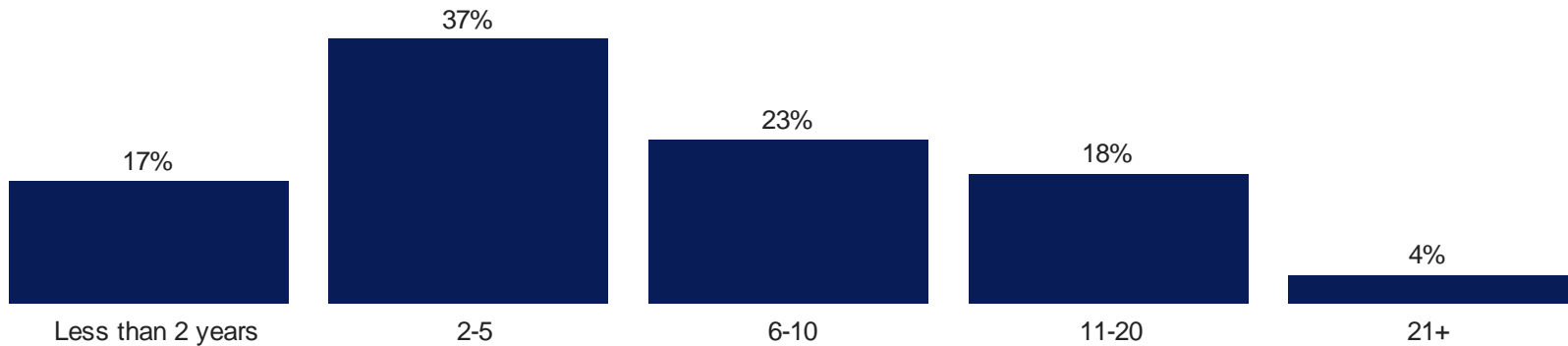
Current role/position:

How many years have you been working in your current role/position?



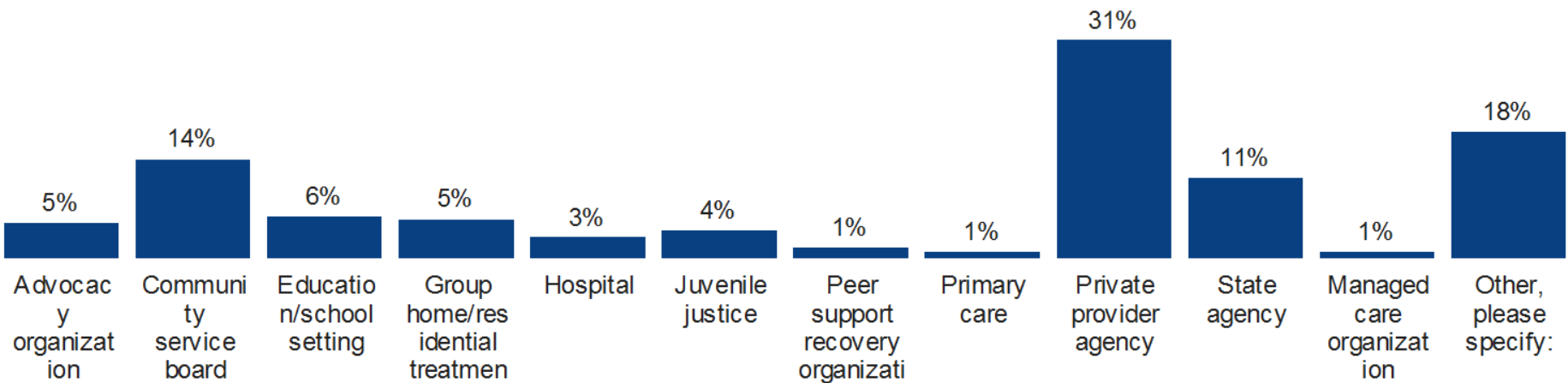

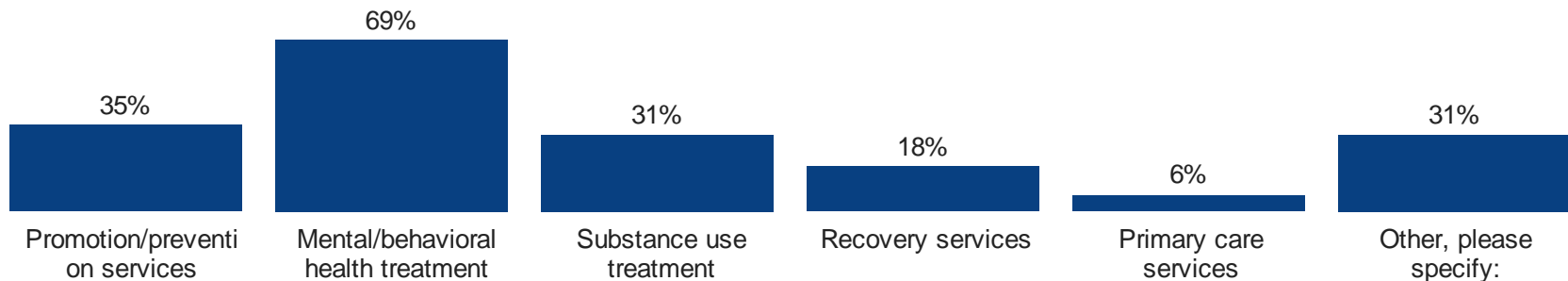

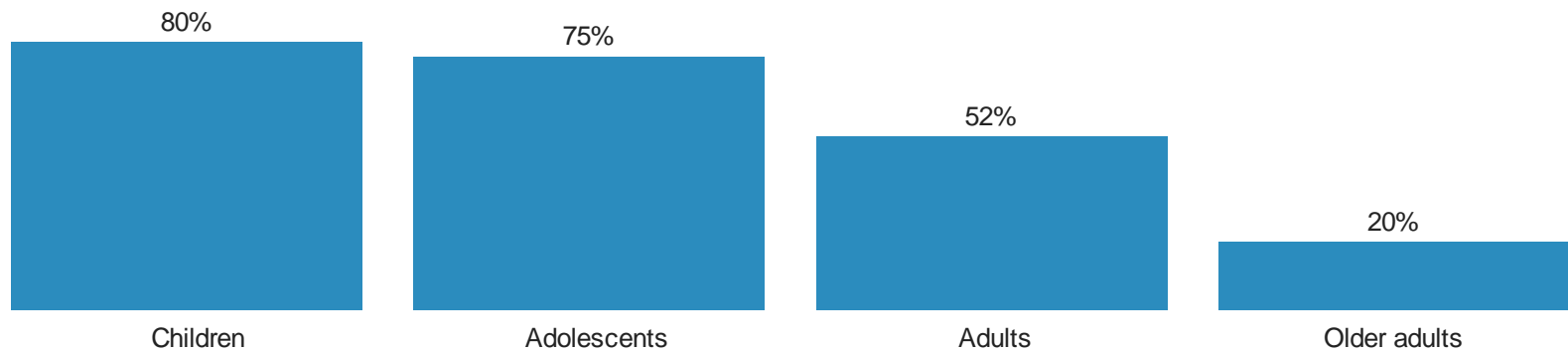
